

LECTURER IN NURSING AND HEALTH POLICY

This post offers the successful candidate the opportunity to work in a dynamic and rapidly growing University based School of Nursing that is closely associated with a number of partner health services. This is a very exciting time in the development of nursing practice, nursing research and education in Ireland. The School of Nursing in Dublin City University is at the forefront of these developments.

The School of Nursing currently offers the Pre-registration BSc (Hons) in Nursing working in partnership with 6 partner services:

BSc (Hons) Nursing (General Nursing) is offered in partnership with Beaumont Hospital and James Connolly Memorial Hospital, Blanchardstown (Northern Area Health Board)

BSc Nursing (Psychiatric Nursing) is offered in partnership with St. Vincent's Hospital, Fairview and St Ita's Hospital Portrane (Northern area Health Board)

BSc (Hons) Nursing (Mental handicap) is offered in partnership with the Daughters of Charity Services, Dublin, and St Joseph's Intellectual Disabilities Service, Northern Area Health Board.

The remaining two years of the pre-registration Diploma in Nursing is also offered in partnership with the above services.

The School of Nursing also offers a part-time Bachelor of Nursing Studies Degree at Post-registration level and Graduate Diploma / MSc Programme that includes a number of specialist pathways for the preparation of clinical specialists in the area of Mental Health, Intellectual Disabilities and Renal Nursing.

The Lecturer in Nursing and Health Policy is expected to contribute significantly to the curriculum development, teaching and administrative activity in the School of Nursing, across all levels, with a particular emphasis on post-graduate course provision. Supervision of Post-graduate research students and a commitment to the development of a programme of research in the area of nursing and health policy will also be an expected part of the role.

The Lecturer appointed will be expected to be sensitive to the evolving education, research and clinical agenda in nursing and health care in Ireland. He / she will be expected to take a lead role in developing the response of the School of Nursing to some of these developments.

The suitable candidate will be at Doctoral level with a proven track record in teaching, course development and course administration. Recognised skills in team development and leadership is a requirement. Evidence of a proven track record in research would be a significant advantage.
